Conard Years Alumni


Vicky MacLean class of 1968

After TMS I went to St Lawrence and earned a geology degree while also spending a lot of time skiing and backpacking in the Adirondacks. Then it was off to Wyoming for grad school which I never finished. In 1976 I ended up in Montana where I worked for about 12 years for a small natural resources consulting firm. The up and down nature of consulting allowed me (and my then husband) to collect a kennel full of sled dogs and pursue a lot of time on the trails of the nearby National Forests on a dog sled behind a team of dogs.

A divorce forced me to change careers as my consulting job required a lot of travel which was impossible as sole owner of a large number of sled dogs. I went to work for the Helena National Forest as a range management technician while going back to school and collecting the range and wildlife credits I needed to pursue a professional career in that field. It was a wonderful job with summers spent in the field - often on horseback - working with local ranchers who had grazing leases on the National Forest. I retired in 2008, by then having gotten out of the sled dog hobby and into retriever field trials with my Labrador retrievers. During my early retirement I was able to write 3 books about the history of the National Forests in Montana. About 10 years af-

ter I retired I moved westward over the continental divide and settled in Ronan Montana, an agricultural area in the beautiful Mission Valley and in the heart of the Flathead Indian Reservation. A big switch from the forested area I had moved from. I eventually acquired about 70 acres of hay ground, garden, small orchard and retriever training grounds. This keeps me busy, outdoors and in touch with the local farmers and ranchers. I am also involved with some social justice groups and started some volunteer work with the Flathead Indian Irrigation Project. This is very interesting as water rights and Native American issues are very contentious.

I still go east to see family in Connecticut twice a year and try to get up to Vermont for old times' sake. I would love to see any TMS grads who are in the area or traveling through. Benton Jones s87 By Eva Bogan s23



Benton Jones, spring '87, is spreading inspiration and information about environmental justice through his artwork in metal and glass.

While Benton first attended Carnegie Mellon for business and industrial management, he acknowledges that, "I knew it was probably not the right path for me, but it was the path of least resistance to follow in my family's footsteps." However, after falling in love with art through taking electives in it, Benton switched paths and graduated with a degree in sculpture. Benton attributes the Mountain School with helping him find his love of art and nature. He recalls going on a Mountain School trip to attend a lecture at UMass Amherst about climate change- that was the first he had ever heard of it. From there on, Benton became invested in environmental issues, and it shows in his artwork. Many of Benton's pieces are made with reclaimed materials. In a 2013 exhibition of his artwork at the Cape Cod Museum of Art titled "Ocean:Us", Benton used glass from a local aquarium that had closed to create his sculptures. He also used discarded glass flotation spheres, devices that are made for deep ocean exploration and can measure ocean salinity and currents. Although the spheres are incredibly strong, each weighing around 40 pounds and able to withstand pressure 4 miles below the ocean's surface, they do need to be replaced over time- so Benton reclaimed them for his Melting Hemispheres collection. Benton formed the glass from these spheres into shapes resembling specific ice formations, naming each piece after

the type of ice it resembled. Benton says that these pieces are a way of paying homage and celebrating the ice formations before they disappear due to humans' environmental impact, while also bringing attention to the issue of climate change.

Benton was excited by the idea of immersing himself in nature when he first applied to the Mountain School. He recalls being awed by how Elliott Coleman, the lead farmer at the time, had the ability "to work miracles" in growing things. Benton himself went on to a type of farming later in his life—oyster farming. He and a friend run an oyster farm in Cape Cod Bay, still in operation. Benton says that oyster farming is a great way for him to connect with the environment, and on top of that, it has many positive environmental impacts, like the cleaning of extra nitrates from the bay, filtering of water, and offers a habitat for other creatures. He enjoys oyster farming and spending time on the flats.

Recently, Benton took on the role of Director of Art at the Cape Cod Museum of Art. There, he produces exhibitions and creates themes for artists to respond to environmental issues. He is currently receiving artwork for an international exhibition called "In Tandem", which will showcase artwork featuring examples of how humanity can live 'in tandem' with the environment. Benton says that one of his biggest gratifications is feeling that "I am able to take some of my personal concerns, issues that have always resonated with me, and that were

reinforced by the Mountain School, and be able to ask other artists to postulate on these issues, allowing the Cape Cod Museum of Art to offer many points of view around them". Benton also operates his own Millstone Sculpture Gallery in Brewster, MA.

"The Mountain School certainly helped me discover myself," says Benton, and advises current students to "follow your bliss and not to ever limit yourself or to create expectations that constrain your ability to have an impact... I think everybody needs to realize that they have the capacity to grow and evolve and change and become better throughout their whole life. Who you are today won't be who you are tomorrow, but if you slowly and incrementally follow your bliss, eventually you will find your way."

And then boom — we became a patchwork blended melting pot family and moved to Oakland with Sam, and then we had Elliot. who is a total mensch. Life is good - Sam launched this fall and is loving his independence, and David and I have the privilege to spend a lot of time together, and also with Elliot. Time Affluence, I've been told it's called — sounds right.

I'm working 1 day a week in addiction medicine and I'm grateful and humbled by the work every time. Oakland is almost always sunny and 60 degrees, come visit.

I've been diving deep into how we make connections with other people — including why connection can be fraught and how to find flow. This has helped me in my work with people who have addiction and also with my 3 guys at home!

I've recently finished reading:

The Myth of Normal by Gabor Maté

Hold on to Your Kids: Why Parents Matter (also by Maté)

Us by Terrence Real (Bruce Springsteen's marriage counselor!)

I'm looking for recommendations on conflict de-escalation (especially considering that next year is a presidential election year)."

Joshua Rappaport reports that "Jennifer Chase-Rappaport s87 and I are still happily ensconced in the Great NorthWest and enjoying the relative peace and quiet of an empty nest, having just dispatched our youngest to join her older sibling at Western Washington University. A customer walks into a jewelry store holding a piece of jewelry they've had in their family for generations. They may assume it's costume jewelry and worthless, but still, they're eager to figure out the provenance of this piece that's been part of their family for as long as they remember. "I get to tell people what they have and what it's worth." Lea Koonce Ogundiran went to the Mountain School in the spring of 1990 and then went to Boston University to study biology. Only after graduating did she find her true passion: gemology.

Lea grew up in Cleveland and welcomed a semester away from city life at the Mountain School. While in Vershire, she met her best friend, had some run-ins with the sheepdog, and immersed herself in nature. To this day, she is particularly proud of herself for completing solo – something she didn't know if she could finish.

As a young adult, Lea developed a long-term interest in rocks and auctions. She pursued her passion beginning with a part-time job as an auction assistant at an auction house in Boston after college. It was there that she realized that gemology was a field she wanted to pursue, and went on to get a degree from the Gemological Institute of America (GIA).

While pursuing her advanced degree, she landed a job at an auction house in New York City. Since then, she moved to Charlotte, NC, and currently works as a jewelry buyer and appraiser at Perry's at South Park, a jewelry store. Additionally, she appears as a jeweler appraiser on the Antiques Roadshow. Lea's favorite parts of her job are "getting to meet people from all walks of life", and getting to uncover the hidden backstories behind beautiful pieces of jewelry. She is one of few African-American people in the field of gemology and explains how she faces challenges, as people don't normally expect to see her in this field. She has, however, met many amazing people throughout her career and has gotten a lot of help along the way.

Lea stresses the importance of a liberal arts education and still carries lessons from the Mountain School with her today. She recalls reading Thoreau and Walden in English class and explains how the majority of her work today involves English and history skills. Although she did not end up becoming a marine biologist, the science she studied in college greatly helped her in studying the chemical composition of gems while at GIA. Her love of uncovering the backstory behind the things around her, though, all began at the Mountain School when tasked to understand the backstory of a tree. Nature, she says, plays a huge role in a lot of the jewelry she encounters, as many artisans are oten inspired by nature. While in Vermont, Lea spent her time admiring the beauty in her surroundings and continues to appreciate the beauty of nature when studying jewels and gems.

One of the most important skills Lea learned in the Mountain School community was problem-solving. She remembers how, especially on solo, students had to figure out how to solve problems that don't even have a correct solution. She carries these values with her as a jewelry appraiser while she uncovers the mysteries behind pieces of jewelry and is in a position to share with people the truth behind something they value so deeply. For Lea, her work is even more about the people wearing the jewelry than the jewelry itself. She adores helping people and seeing the looks on their faces when they find out the context, origin, and significance. To current and future Mountain School students, she advises them to "enjoy all the fabulous people" and to immerse themselves in the wonderful community of the Mountain School.

Even before she came to the Mountain School in Spring 2018, Vivien Qiao knew that she wanted her career to be in biochemistry and medicine. Not only did she have an interest in learning about the human body and the most effective ways to treat it, but both of her parents were chemists, as well. Now, as a double major in Engineering and Biochemistry and a Goldwater Scholar at Smith College, Vivien has been working in lab to perform biochemical research. During her time at the Mountain School, she learned the importance of thoughtful, intentional decision making; with this value, she was able to choose the path that best fit her goals for her future.

The Mountain School was a novel experience for Vivien. She grew up in suburban Massachusetts, a far cry from the sparsely populated farmland of rural Vermont and didn't consider herself to be very outdoorsy. The hands-on, nature-focused curriculum of the school was a change from her sending school. The idea of calling teachers by their first names was foreign to her. This alternative style of schooling was, in a way, one of Vivien's biggest takeaways from TMS, helping her to realize that learning didn't have to be traditional. She remarked on the "specific, linear MD path" that most undergraduates follow, and how she didn't want to pursue a postgraduate degree in the same fashion. Instead, Vivien balanced her time between academic pursuits and other, more recreational interests. "Knowing you can deviate from that traditional path and still reach the same goal is comforting," she said.

American Studies and Psychology and minoring in African-American Studies! She plans to be in NYC this summer and hopes to see some of you:)


